

Celebrity on a Enchanting Chester Farm

A Sunday, August 1, 2010 New York Times article by Elizabeth Jensen featured the headline "The Man Who Captivated Ken Burns" and went on to describe how the acclaimed documentary filmmaker Ken Burns met William Segal in the mid-1970s in a drawing workshop in Dorchester, Mass., and again years later at Mr. Segal's "farm" in Chester, N.J. in 1992. Whether it be called a farm, a country retreat, a meeting place, makes no difference -- the property is fifteen hilly, wooded, some might say enchanting acres located on South Road -- where a stream then rests on a meditative pond, and where two very interesting men began a meaningful collaboration.

Ken Burns' award-winning documentaries include "Brooklyn Bridge" (1981), an 18-hour history of "Baseball" (1984), "The Civil War" (1990), "Lewis and Clark: the Journey of the Corps of Discovery (1997) and most recently, "The National Parks: America's Best Idea" (2009). What brings us back to Chester is one of Mr. Burns' earlier works, "...three short and intimate films about William Segal, a painter and spiritual teacher" that were filmed between 1992 and 2000, the year Mr. Segal died at age 95.

William Segal (1904 - 2000) was a philosopher, publisher, writer, painter, selfmade man, entrepreneur, teacher and student of life who made a lasting and important impression on Ken Burns and many others. One web site states that William Segal "searched relentlessly and compassionately for meaning in the 20th century...helped bring Western and Eastern spiritual traditions together, stressing what connects humanity rather than what differentiates it." Ross Smyth was one of the early members of the Chester Historical Society, and he jumped into the organization with enthusiasm. Early during his membership, CHS bought the museum on Grove Street. The funds came from a Mennen family gift of twenty-five shares of Avon stock worth around twenty-five thousand dollars. The gift was brokered by the Reverend Robert Maseroni of the Community Presbyterian Church. Ross favored investing the proceeds, but a majority of other members supported buying a building for a museum during the bicentennial years. And so CHS went into the museum business.

Even though Ross was cool to the museum, he embraced it with his time and labor, frequently personally fixing broken or worn out parts of the structure. Once, when he was working in the basement ceiling joists, he was bitten by what he thought might have been a centipede. The bite took a long, long, long time to heal.

Ross also jumped at being offered the position of financial advisor and treasurer, placing the CHS money into high-yield investment funds. His mantra, "never touch the principal," still echoes in the halls of the Society today. Proceeds from the barn sale, memberships, gifts and publications all went into Ross's treasury. To remove funds, one needed Board approval, Ross's approval, and a letter from the Queen. George had this disease and so does Ed. It must infect you when you open the ledger books.

Working tirelessly at the barn sale, Ross's contributions were endless. He was one of the few retired but still able-bodied members, so he would pick up items at your home, shuttle people around, help sort and on sale day, cart items to people's cars. He complained often about the "cabin full of junk," but always stayed with it until the barn sold out.

When the museum was finally sold, Ross was ecstatic. The sale proceeds of \$40,000 were immediately invested, and, in spite of several major purchases, projects and publishing adventures, Ross succeeded in doubling the investment in ten years. The Society owes him their gratitude for creating a solid portfolio and for watching the funds as though they were his own. Ross was often opinionated, ruggedly refined, annoyingly persistent, financially savvy and personally generous to a fault. Always appreciative of caring people and jobs well done, he was a close friend of the Taylors and of the Chester Historical Society.

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CHS 2011 Program Plan: Discover and Help Write Chester's History



Members and guests are invited to participate in a detailed study of Chester's history in 2011. The Society's publication, "Chester, New Jersey -- A Scrapbook of History" by Frances Greenidge will serve as the primary reference, study guide, and discussion guide. "The Scrapbook" as it is called, is described by the author as a "collection of widely gathered "scraps" of information and memories pieced together in order to preserve a historical picture of Chester."

The 175-page spiral-bound book consists of seventeen densely detailed, fascinating chapters, extensive appendices, numbered references, and illustrations, spanning the years 1713 - 1971, from "Before the Settlers" to "Then...and Now". Plans are to gather at 7 p.m. on the 2nd Thursday of the month at the Chester Library, to discuss several chapters of the book, beginning in March 2011. At the March meeting, participants will be given an orientation to the program, its study objectives, the schedule. and will be asked to begin gathering their own "scraps" of modern day Chester history to contribute toward what will become the updated edition of the "Scrapbook of History" from 1971 to 2011, the next forty years.

Copies of "The Scrapbook" can be purchased in advance at the Antique Mall on Rte. 24 in Chester, or through the Chester Historical Society. More details about his event will be announced later this year!!

further describes him as "...a student of Daisetz Suzuki, the foremost exponent of Japanese Zen Buddhism in the West, and of the Greco-Armenian mystic and philosopher Gurdjieff. Mr. Segal was co-chairman of the Gurdjeiff Foundation when he died."

A photo in the New York Times article shows a young Ken Burns standing with William Segal on the property in Chester in 1992, where the first of the three short films was made. The property, owned by Mr. Segal for about 40 years, included several outbuildings and the main house, built circa 1945. The buildings served as a gathering place for Mr. Segal's personal and professional circles, hosting visitors from abroad -- Paris, London, Venezuela, and across the U.S., to study, meditate, paint, and learn about the Gurdjieff philosophy.

It was in the last ten years of William Segal's life that he befriended Ken Burns and the two collaborated to produce the trilogy "Seeing, Searching, Being". The first of the trilogy, entitled "William Segal", is filmed in Chester in the art studio and gardens. In it, Mr. Segal talks about the creative process -the relationships between the artist and the



work of art -- while he paints. The second film is "Vezelay" that looks at the beautiful serenity of the basilica at Vezelay in France. The third film is "In the Marketplace" which was filmed in Paris and follows Mr. Segal's everyday life, embracing all that is around him, living in the moment.

As of press time, we believe a presentation is scheduled for the PBS Pledge Drive on September 12th, 2010. The trilogy is also available for sale on DVD -- check PBS.org and search "Ken Burns" filmography for details.
