A Note from our President, Alison Dahl (Thanks to Meryl Carmel for the editing assistance!)

Time for our annual recap of events as we wrap up fiscal year 2012.

This was an unusually busy year for the Chester Historical Society that included a major move and encouraging information about the state of the archives. While we were sidetracked from "business as usual" in several ways, the experience has left us stronger, forward-looking and more committed than ever to preserving the history of the Chesters!



As a result of changes determined by the library, the Chester Historical Society is no longer based in the Carmen Smith Room. But thanks to the generosity of Chester Borough's Mayor and Council, we will soon establish our new home over at the Borough Offices at 50 North Road. This provides modern, convenient work space, and is fortuitously located near the archives storage at 100 North Road, courtesy of Chester Township's Mayor and Council.

When the new CHS office is settled, members of the public can arrange to do research at this site by contacting our soon-to-be-named Archives Chairperson. In addition, the CHS has access to the services of the library's part-time Local History Librarian. We were enormously pleased by feedback from professional archivist Gary Seretzky, who conducted our CAPES assessment, the purpose of which is to inspect and provide best practices and guidelines for organizing and preserving the vast array of materials in the archives. This year saw a small and dedicated band gather to further delve into Chester's past as they worked their way through Frances Greenidge's "Chester, New Jersey: A Scrapbook of History". The "study group" worked to refine and elaborate on the wealth of information this reference provides. The society has continued to grow its valuable Oral History library thanks to the dedicated efforts of board member Helen Jones, who has spent hours discussing the past with aging residents. To date the Oral History collection includes dozens of tapes from interviews that paint an important picture of the more recent past. Tapes and transcripts will be available to researchers once we are settled in our new quarters.

CHS was a sponsor and contributor to the Chester Trails Plan Project which had the goal of making Chester's abundant natural, artistic, commercial, and historic resources more accessible to residents and visitors. As part of the plan an updated Chester History Tour was developed. Two parents, Heather Ronco and Liz Gugliemini, simplified the Chester History Tour and made presentations to the third grade classes at Bragg Intermediate School. They created the fun "Chester Bingo" game. The Society provided artifacts from our collection to help bring to life the iron mining period of Chester. The third graders had an enjoyable and entertaining lesson on Chester history.

As summer winds down, we are pleased to note that the Society remains fiscally sound. We are already looking forward to reinvigorating our well received history programs beginning with Gordon Ward's presentation of "Welcome to the Past" in October. Many of our monthly CHS programs will continue to be held at the library's Larison Room. New this year will be history programs specifically geared to school age children as a result of the tremendous positive feedback we received from students, parents and teachers regarding our Colonial Days contributions. Multi-talented author and educator **Gordon Ward** returns with his multi-media presentation



Mr. Ward will entertain us with his anecdotes, poetry, songs, photos, and guitar accompaniment that inspire us to value our collective and individual histories. On **Sunday, October 28th**, take a **Walking Tour** of Chester's **"Iron Heyday"** Furnace led by Chester Township Historian Len Taylor. 
First Steps Taken to Organize Our Archives!

The goal -- **to organize the collections of Chester's past** -- newspaper clippings, photos, bottles, ledgers, arrowheads, letters, books, clothing, maps -- a wide array of precious miscellany that comprise the archives of the Chester Historical Society. Ultimately, each of the thousands of items in the archives will be catalogued, preserved, stored, and made accessible to the public. Adequate preparation, as with any major project, is critical to the success of the project.

The archives are stored in a large well-lit room in the former Bell Labs laboratory building at 100 North Road, now owned by Chester Township. The first step in preparation to organize the archives was taken in November 2011 when an *Indoor Environmental Quality Assessment* and *Mold Sampling* was conducted at the archives storage room. The sampling results indicated no unusual sources or conditions. It was determined to be a satisfactory work and storage environment, so it was on to the next step.

In April, the archives facility underwent an assessment by an organization named Mid-Atlantic Regional Archives Conference (MARAC) New Jersey Caucus. MARAC New Jersey Caucus manages a free consultant service with funding by the NJ Historical Commission. The assessment service is called Caucus Archival Projects Evaluation Service, or CAPES.

The CAPES assessment was performed on site by professional archivist Gary Saretzky. The assessment looked at characteristics of the physical plant including temperature, humidity, light levels, pests presence (none) and recommended steps to assure optimum conditions. The CAPES report provided extensive, valuable guidelines from defining the scope of the collections to how to implement archive policies, to how to go about organizing and making the collections available -- with a wealth of recommendations in between.




We **monitor the temperature and humidity** in our Archives room. When the humidity increased higher than desired, a dehumidifier was installed in June and the relative humidity decreased. Over the summer the temperature has started to rise so we are working with Chester Township to provide air conditioning to the room.

Chester History Trail - Updated!

Since 2011 the Chester Historical Society has been supporting and working with a Borough and Township project team to create the "Integrated Trails Ecosystem Plan for Chester", popularly known as "Chester Trails". Historic sites which cluster around downtown and dot the countryside are an important part of the trails ecosystem which permeates Chester. Just as a hiker, walker, or biker enjoys the natural environment, we felt it was important for them to enjoy our historic heritage. Using previous Historical Society publications, 60 historical sites were selected for inclusion in the Chester Trails Plan. Choosing the 60 was hard, but this is just the first selection. Hopefully we will continue to add more.

We have put the 60 sites on a PowerPoint presentation, the Chester History Tour, which will be the subject of a future CHS program.

Each of the 60 sites on the CHS **Auto and Walking Tour** has at least one recent picture of the site, background and historical information. One example is the Methodist Church which we can appreciate even if it burned down in 1921. Using a picture from the CHS archives, we can still tell its story and provide a sense of place, even if it is only a memory.

Methodist Church Federated Church – just a memory



- Methodists have been worshipping in Chester as early as 1868. In 1881 they moved into a building that was moved from Bedminster, now the Black River Playhouse building.
- In 1908 a new Methodist Church was built near the site of the current Boy Scout Cabin in Municipal Park. The church had a "bowled floor lecture room opening into the main audience room, paneled ceiling, beautiful Cathedral glass windows of elaborate design, steam heat, modern pews, choir gallery, a good piano, and lighted by acetylene gas; value of the property \$8000".
- Due to economic reasons the 3 churches of Chester formed the Federated Church in 1918 with 120 Congregationalists, 100 Presbyterians, and 60 Methodists. The Congregationalists withdrew after the war in 1920.
- When the Methodist Church burned down in 1921, most of the Methodists joined the Presbyterian Church.
